The best progress is made in those Troops where power and responsibility are really put into the hands of the Patrol Leaders. This is the Secret of success in Scout Training

The underlying feature is the spirit of the Movement, and the key that unlocks this spirit is the romance of Woodcraft and Nature Lore.

Where is there a boy, or for the matter of that a grown-up man, even in these materialistic times to whom the call of the wild and the open road does not appeal?

Maybe it is a primitive instinct-anyway it is there. With that key a great door may be unlocked, if it is only to admit fresh air and sunshine into lives that were otherwise grey.

But generally it can do more than this.

The heroes of the wild, the frontiersmen and explorers, the rovers of the sea, the airmen of the clouds are Pied Pipers to the boys.

Where they lead the boys will follow, and these will dance to their tune when it sings the song of manliness and pluck, of adventure and high endeavour, of efficiency and skill, of cheerful sacrifice of self for others.

There's meat in this for the boy; there's soul in it.

Watch that lad going down the street, his eyes are looking far out. Is his vision across the prairie or over the grey-backed seas? At any rate, it isn't here. Don't I know it!

Have you never seen the buffaloes roaming in Kensington Gardens? And can't you see the smoke from the Sioux Lodges under the shadow of the Albert Memorial? I have seen them there these many years.

Through Scouting the boy has now the chance to deck himself in a frontier kit as one of the great Brotherhood of Backwoodsmen. He can track and follow signs, he can signal, he can light his fire and build his shack and cook his grub. He can turn his hand to many things in pioneer- and camp-craft.

His unit is the natural gang of the boy, led by its own boy leader.

He may be one of a herd, but he has his own entity. He gets to know the joy of life through the out-of-doors.

Then there is a spiritual side.

Through sips of nature lore imbibed in woodland hikes the puny soul grows up and looks around. The outdoors is par excellence the school for observation and for realising the wonders of a wondrous universe.

It opens to the mind appreciation of the beautiful that lies before it day by day. It reveals to the city youngster that the stars are there beyond the city chimney-pots, and the sunset clouds are gleaming in their glory far above the roof of the "cinema" theatre.

The study of nature brings into a harmonious whole the question of the infinite, the historic, and the microscopic as part of the Great Creator's work. And in these, sex and reproduction play an honoured part.

Scoutcraft is a means through which the veriest hooligan can be brought to higher thought and to the elements of faith in God; and, coupled with the Scout's obligation to do a Good Turn every day, it gives the base of Duty to God and to Neighbour on which the parent or pastor can build with greater ease the form of belief that is desired.

"You can dress a lad as Cowboy, as a Tommy or a Jack,

You can drill him till he looks as smart as paint,

But it does not always follow when you come to scratch his back

That he's really either hero or a saint."

It is the spirit within, not the veneer without that does it.

And the spirit is there in every boy when you get him, only it has to be discovered and brought to light.

The Scout Promise (or Oath) to carry out, on his honour, as far as in him lies, and the Scout Law is our binding disciplinary force, and with ninety-nine out of a hundred it pays. The boy is not governed by DON'T, but is led on by DO. The Scout Law is devised as a guide to his actions rather than as repressive of his faults. It merely states what is good form and expected of a Scout.

03 SLIEMA VENTURE SCOUTS WIN CHALLENGE HIKE IN THE LAKE DISTRICT

On the 6th of July six members of the Venture Unit of the 1st Sliema Scout Group left Malta for the English town of Newcastle. They were hosted by the 4th Newcastle Explorer Scouts, (who had visited Malta two years ago and participated in a number of activities organised by the Sliema Venture Scouts). They were to stay in the UK for two weeks and would experience a full programme consisting of several adventurous sports and activities, including the likes of white water rafting, climbing and bouldering at Europe's second largest indoor climbing centre, hiking, hill-climbing and of course camping in renowned picturesque locations such as the Lake District and Southern Scotland as well as visits to places of cultural interest such as Hadrian's Wall and Edinburgh Castle.

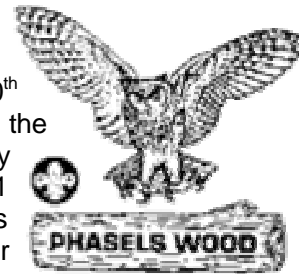
One of the activities was the District Mountain Activities Challenge Hike; which is essentially a hill-climbing challenge organised by one the Sunderland District Scout Association. The objective is to climb as many hills as possible, thus achieving as many points as possible, within the competition's 36 hour duration. Against all expectations the Sliema Ventures walked away the surprise winners of their age category, climbing an impressive 2,800 metres, and even scaling England's highest point,

'Scafell Pike', which alone stands at 987 metres. All this on their debut, not only in this specific competition, but in any hill-climbing competition. This is quite an achievement, considering that the highest point in Malta is under 250 metres. Another important fact is that this year, out of the 10 teams competing; only the Sliema Ventures' Team and another 2 teams completed their planned route. In the true spirit of Scouting the Sliema Venture Unit has taken fundamental steps in broadening their horizons and have benefited from a wealth of new experiences. 09 JOTA / JOTI held on the 16th / 17th October

The World Scout Jamboree on the Internet (JOTI) is an international Scout Meeting on the Internet which takes place every year on the third weekend of October. This is an official event of the World Organization of the Scout Movement. During this weekend, thousands of Scouts from all over the world meet and communicate with each other over the Internet, using any technologies locally available, from web browsers to e-mail, chat programs, microphones, scanners and digital cameras. Scout groups can combine this event with the Jamboree on the Internet (JOTI) an event where Scouts can communicate with each other over radio amateur frequencies with the assistance of a local radio amateur crew.

Most of the communication takes place over E-mail and in a chat network called IRC, the Internet Relay Chat. JOTI allows you to build friendships with Scouts in other countries and to find out more about their civil and scouting life. Often, these contacts last for years and build the base for upcoming group trips and enterprises. Since 1996, JOTI is an official WOSM event and has a permanent place on the Web Site of the World Scout Bureau. Scout Groups participating in this year's event were the Fgura, Mosta / Rabat (jointly), Marsa, Qawra, Qrendi, San Gwann (at IHQ), Sliema, St. Augustine's College Air Scouts, St Venera, Xghajra and Zurrieq Groups. Level 3 – Basic Adult Leadership Training (Lv3/003/04 - Second Weekend)

The second weekend of Level 3 has been postponed to the third weekend of January 2005.
