## POINTS TO REMEMBER

### The Heroes in our Groups

*Aids to Scoutmastership B.-P. 1920*

The Scoutmaster who is a hero to his boys holds a powerful lever to their development, but at the same time brings a great responsibility to himself. They are quick enough to see the smallest characteristic about him, whether it be a virtue or a vice. His mannerisms become theirs, the amount of courtesy he shows, his irritations, his sunny happiness or his impatient glower, his willing self-discipline or his occasional moral lapses – all are not only noticed, but adopted by his followers.

Therefore, to get them to carry out the Scout Law and all that underlies it the Scoutmaster himself should scrupulously carry out its professions in every detail of his life. With scarcely a word of instruction his boys will follow him.

### 1. The Chief Scout takes up new responsibilities related to Youth and the Arts

Although most of you would by now have already heard the news, it is, however, with pleasure to announce that the Chief Scout, Mr Vincent Cassar, has only recently been appointed by the Prime Minister to the post of Permanent Secretary in the newly established Ministry for Youth and the Arts. The Hon Jesmond Mugliette is the Minister responsible for this Ministry, which amongst other matters deals directly with all aspects related to youth affairs.

The Chief Scout is a *Perit* (Architect and Civil Engineer) by profession and has been involved in a variety of large scale public construction projects that

have been carried out during the last thirty (30) years both in Malta and in Gozo. Born on the 27 January 1947 at Valletta he studied at the St Joseph School in Valletta and later at the Lyceum at Hamrun. It was precisely at the latter school that he commenced his Scouting career as a member of the Lyceum Group.

In 1971 he graduated from the University of Malta with the degree of Bachelor of Architecture. Following a two year period in private practice as a *Perit* he then joined Government service in October 1973 as a Junior Architect and Civil Engineer rising to occupy in 1992 the highest post within the Public Works organisation, that of Director General, which post he has ably and actively occupied since then.

As stated above Mr Cassar has now been assigned the duties of Permanent Secretary within the Ministry for Youth and the Arts. This Ministry that has only recently been established deals with all aspects relating to Youth, Sport, the Arts, Theatre, Music and Cultural Heritage. It is the Ministry that has under its wings the Youth Co-ordinating Committee on which Committee the Scout Association of Malta is also represented.

It is of extreme significance to record that an active member of the Scout Association of Malta, more importantly so its Chief Scout, has been entrusted with this responsibility that among other matters includes the management of an area that is so crucial to the further development and well-being of youth in Malta.

We wish our Chief Scout every success in his new appointment.

## **3. St Michael School Scout Troop spends Easter Camp in Sicily**

Towards the end of April, members of the St Michael School Scout Troop spent its Easter Camp at Camping Marinello, in Oliveri, Sicily. This is a beautiful area, just an hour or so outside Messina, with some breathtaking views and an endless beach. The troop organised cultural visits to Messina, Taormina and the beautiful old Roman village of Tindari, which stands majestically on top of a hill just above the campsite. Indeed, the troop ventured to Tindari by hiking up the hill, which walk is generally undertaken yearly by pilgrims from all over Sicily and Italy on the 5<sup>th</sup> of September, which is the feast commemorating the finding of the black Madonna and Child.

The Troop also visited Mount Etna. Members and leaders who had visited the volcanic mountain before were surprised at the drastic - even disastrous - changes

effected by the eruption of 2001. A number of guest houses, bars/cafes and souvenir shops no longer exist, and a number of roads have been destroyed. The cable car connection was half-buried in lava. The Troop made the most of their trip there, however, by hiking up the path, and then crossing ground to find a patch of snow. Snow-games ensued, among much laughter and hilarity.

The Troop made contact with the local scouts, the Oliveri Scouts. In spite of the date of the meeting being a public holiday - thereby entailing many members of the Oliveri group being out of town - the group did its utmost to muster as many members as it could. The Maltese Scouts were shown round the headquarters, and exchanged information regarding practices, songs sung before and after dinner, and most popular games. Scarves and other memorabilia were exchanged, and the Sicilian group later joined the Maltese group for a pizza at a lido just before the beach. The two Troops have exchanged willingness to host each other's Scouts and headquarters in future.

The long trips between one place and another were punctuated by some traditional campsite songs, which still ring through the travellers' ears though they have now returned home. The entire camp has been a success, and now the Troop is looking forward to eventually hosting their new Italian friends. What a way to spend Easter

### **11. Three Cross Award in First Aid – St John Ambulance**

St John ambulance has recently announced a Three Cross Award in First Aid, most suitable for scouting programs. The programme can be taught by

anyone in possession of a valid St John Ambulance First aid certificate to their scouts whose ages vary between ten and fifteen years.

The time required to fulfil all the course requirements varies and depends on the actual amount of the students together with the length of each session. Recommended durations for each award are as follows

The **One Cross Award** usually takes 1 to 2 hours

The **Two Cross Award** usually takes 3 to 4 hours

The **Three Cross Award** usually takes 4 to 5 hours.

The total costs involved are Lm 1.00 per student, covering the presentation of a certificate and a badge. A booklet and "hand outs" are also available for use by the students. A tutorial video is readily available at a cost of Lm.10.00 if purchased, or can be borrowed against a refundable deposit from St John Ambulance.

The program can be run at ones own Group's Headquarters with the aid of a video player and television that is required during three of the sessions.
